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Annual Council Christmas party, pot-luck social, Nikomo and gift gathering for St Joseph's Indian School

The Council meeting on December 3rd will be short so that we may have a pot-luck social, a Nikomo (gift sharing) & Christmas party. It is asked that everyone bring a dish to share.

The Nikomo is a form of giving a gift to others. You bring an unwrapped gift, not for anyone specific, whether bought or handmade. You place it on the blanket with other gifts. After the meeting at some time during the social, the members will line up, "eldest" first, and you will take your turn and choose any gift from the blanket that you would like.

Also in keeping with the season, and as a gesture of the heart, we ask you to please bring a small unwrapped item/gift, which will be added with others, that we will be sending to St Joseph's Indian School. The Sioux children that attend the school are very poor and need OUR help. The gifts don't have to be expensive. You can find many nice things at stores like, Dollar Tree, Job Lot etc. The school asked for girls & boy's underwear, (all sizes) as well as socks, health & beauty aids (soaps, deodorants, shampoos, etc.), and all types of school supplies, not to mention toys (see page 8 for more needed things).

NATIVE TEACHINGS: Wampanoag Tribe Facts

<u>Introduction</u>: With all of us just getting through the Thanksgiving season I thought it would be great to share some true facts about the Wampanoag Tribe who were the very first to celebrate the holiday in the New World as it was called back then.

The Wampanoag Native American People are known as the "People of the Light" or the "People of the First Light". The First Light was their gift from the Creator to Wampanoag people as their land has one of the earliest sunrises in the east coast. Wampanoag land was from the Southeastern part of Mass. to the eastern part of Rhode Island. Without the aid of the tribe, the English settlement would have perished during their first harsh winter in New England. The Tribe were excellent hunters, fisherman/whalers, and cultivated the land to survive and supply food to their village. They were taught to use many resources; giving thanks always to the Creator, and to show respect for everything they took for their use. Their mind set was always to preserve some for the next seven generations of the unborn and not to waste anything. The tribe is well known for as the tribe that shared a harvest celebration with the Pilgrims from the Ship the Mayflower. These settlers arrived at Plymouth in the middle of winter of 1620 totally unprepared for it; as we all know, following a long difficult voyage at sea. They were unable to plant any food for themselves and found themselves lost in the new world. The Wampanoag were very kind to them shared food, and a friendly cooperative relationship it is said of ten years more or less. However, as more and more Colonist arrived they tried to convert the tribe to their faith and thus the troubles began. Imagine what this must have been like for the tribe after expressing compassion and support to these people now they were making demands on them. They themselves had moved from their beloved homeland because of religious persecution only to try to force it on the tribe. Well, it was only to be a matter of time before things were to change as they did and relationships turned bad, and that is another story.

America was not the "new world" to the Wampanoag, but rather the homeland of many Indigenous nations of many diverse cultures. As caretakers of the land; life centered on providing food and shelter for their families and maintaining a peaceful village. They had summer homes, as well winter homes, and would migrate between the seasons.



Massasoit was the leader of the Wampanoag Tribe and a very wise man, to say the least. Wampanoag leaders were known as sachems, and the title was passed down through family lines, including women if no male could claim the title. The leaders had the respect of others in the tribe, but worked with the rest of the community and did not have special privileges attached to their title, and did not command others. The Wampanoag also had a Grand Sachem, who provided leadership over the entire tribe.

In the early 1600s, before many European settlers began colonizing, there was an estimated number of 12,000 people belonging to this community of Native Americans. From 1614-1620, diseases that arrived with the early European colonist swept through the region, and destroyed villages. By 1620, there were only about an estimated 5,000 Wampanoag people left. Another outbreak of disease had spread in the year 1855 and caused more deaths on the island of Nantucket.

<u>Conclusion</u>: Our Creator blessed the Colonist with the gift of the Wampanoag Tribe, who live on today, after going through so many trials and hardships. They are and should be an inspiration to all of us no matter what back ground we are from to always give thanks to our Creator for our Blessings and His helping hands.

From Fall River, Providence, and points north, take Route 195 east to Route 24S. Follow 24S to Fish Rd exit in Tiverton. Take left off the ramp and follow Fish Rd approx. 2 miles past the Tiverton Police station. Tiverton Rod & Gun Club is on your right. If you see Bulgarmarsh RD, you passed it.

From southern RI, take the Jamestown and Newport bridges and continue through Middletown & Portsmouth on Route 114 (West Main Road) to Route 24N. Once across the Sakonnet River Bridge, take Fish Rd exit. Bear to right at Police station and follow approx. 2 miles.

<u>Native Recipe</u>

** I know we used this last year, but it's so good.









Ingredients:

2 eggs ³/₄ cup molasses 1 ¹/₂ cups flour 1 ¹/₂ teaspoon ginger ¹/₄ teaspoon salt 1/2 cup sour cream
1/4 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon ground clove
1/2 cup melted butter

Beat the eggs and add the sour cream, molasses and sugar and beat again.

In a separate bowl, sift together the dry ingredients; flour, baking soda, ginger, clove and salt.

Stir into sour cream mixture and add melted butter.

Pour into greased and floured 9" square pan.

Bake 35 minutes at 350*

Serve warm with whipped cream or light lemon sauce.
